



Game-Breakers

In the sport of football, the big play can break a game wide open. As a result, those that make them are called "game-breakers." Whether it is with speed as a receiver, strength as a running back, or innate cover skills as a cornerback, game-breaker-type players have a profound effect on the final outcome. With that said, we selected 15 premier game-breakers from each of the 15 teams.

Shawn Honovich can literally do it all. He's a blur taking handoffs at running back and oh-so-dangerous returning kicks and punts on special teams. Not to mention, he also plays a glove-like safety and handles punting duties.

"We can put Shawn anywhere on the field and he can do the job, he's very unique," Walter Panas Head Coach Anthony Fata said. "He's just great to watch, especially when he gets in the open field."

Last season, Honovich ran for 791 yards on 132 carries for almost six yards a carry. He also ran for 10 of the Panthers' 15 rushing touchdowns. You can expect much of the same this fall.

TJ Warren has the ability to grind out tough yards inside and break outside the edge for big gainers. "TJ is a good kid and he's one of our team leaders who has the ability to make things happen for us," Peekskill Head Coach Stephen Capriglione said.

Matt Fedro had a breakout campaign last year, hauling in 16 catches for 235 yards and two touchdowns. He also excelled on special teams, returning 11 punts for 235 yards, which averages out to 20.91 yards a return. Fedro is a precise route-runner that has a knack for making the first defender miss. As a result, he racks up impressive YAC (yards after catch) numbers.

already-impressive speed. Trall's ability to accelerate deep in a route allows him to easily gain separation from the opposing cornerback. Look for "Krazy Glue" to be running under a ton of Tyler Dorien bombs in '09. Croton Head Coach John Catano summed it up best: "If Joe catches the ball, usually something very good happens."

Jameson Pickel is the perfect fit for Head Coach Jimmy Clark's spread offense. First, he has a long stride to break into the open field on options plays. Second, he has a keen football sense and a strong arm,

allowing him to hit open receivers in stride. Pickel is a strong candidate to lead the North County in combined rushing/passing yards and touchdown passes.

Lakeland Head Coach Rob Cappelli feels that junior fullback **Paul Briggs** can give the Hornets something big when they need it. As a fullback, Briggs combines the rare combination of speed and power. "Paul is someone to look out for," Cappelli said. "He's very fast for a fullback. He can be a game-breaker for us, without a doubt."

Entering his third season entrenched as the starter,

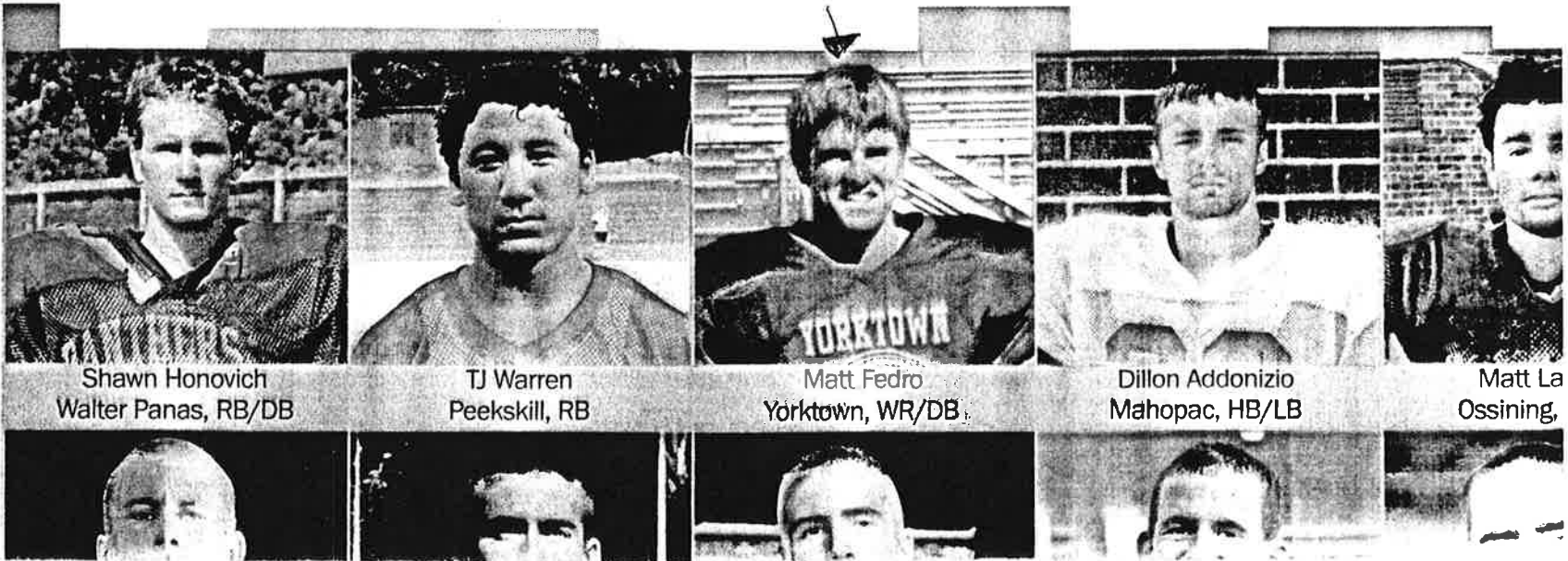
Ryan Shilling possesses all the intangibles of an MVP quarterback: speed, smarts, pocket presence and accuracy. He was impressive throwing and rushing the ball last season, racking up 529 yards and two touchdowns on the ground and 1,142 yards and 10 touchdowns through the air. Look for him to play an even bigger role this season, leading a relatively inexperienced Rams offense.

Matt Delana's best season as a Tusker came in his freshman year where he rushed for 663 yards and eight touchdowns. He battled injuries through his sopho-

more and junior campaigns. But now he's 1 out with a bang.

Delana, who only stands at 5-foot-7, is 1 player on the field most nights. He'll bow over, drag two or three with him, or juke their cleats. Defensively, he's just as strong. All we have to do for Matt to have a great him healthy," Head Coach Tony DeMatter an absolute dude."
